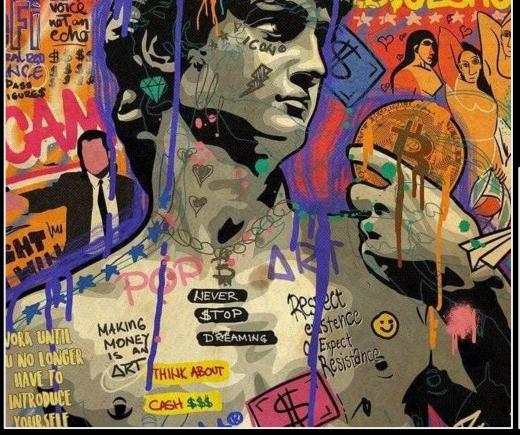












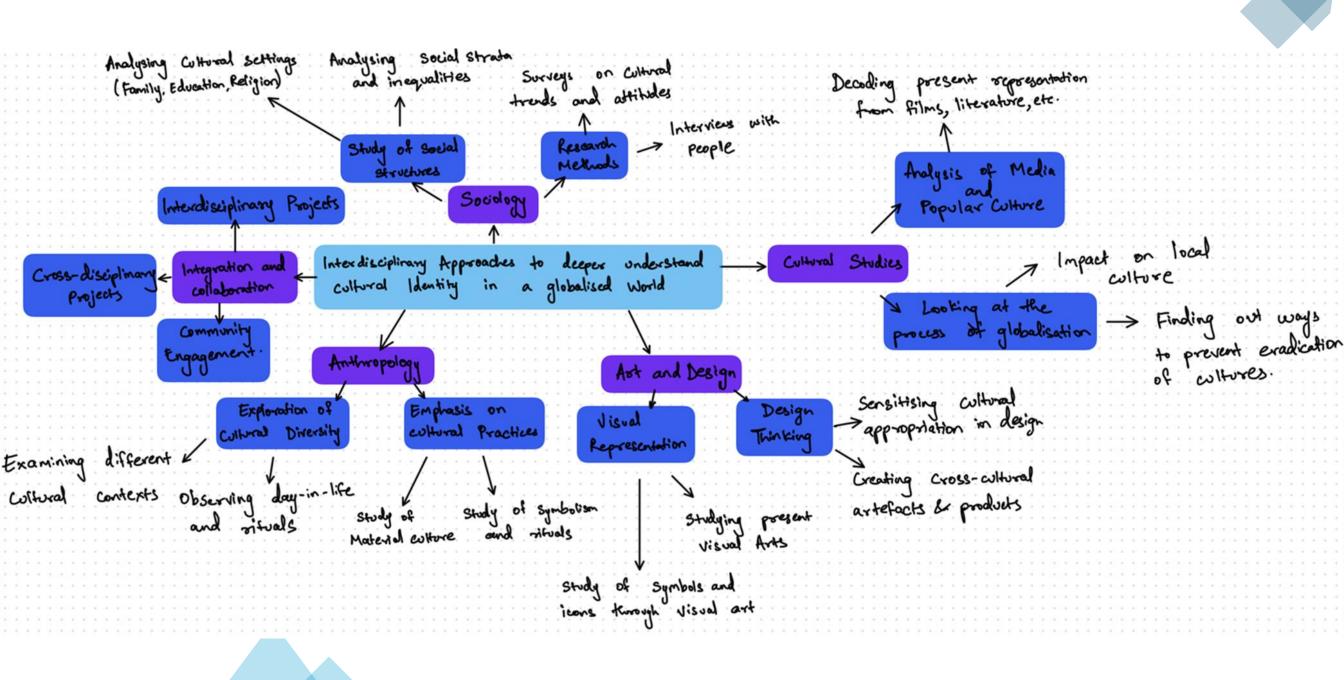


# How do media and technology influence cultural exchange and shape perceptions of cultural identity in a globalized world?

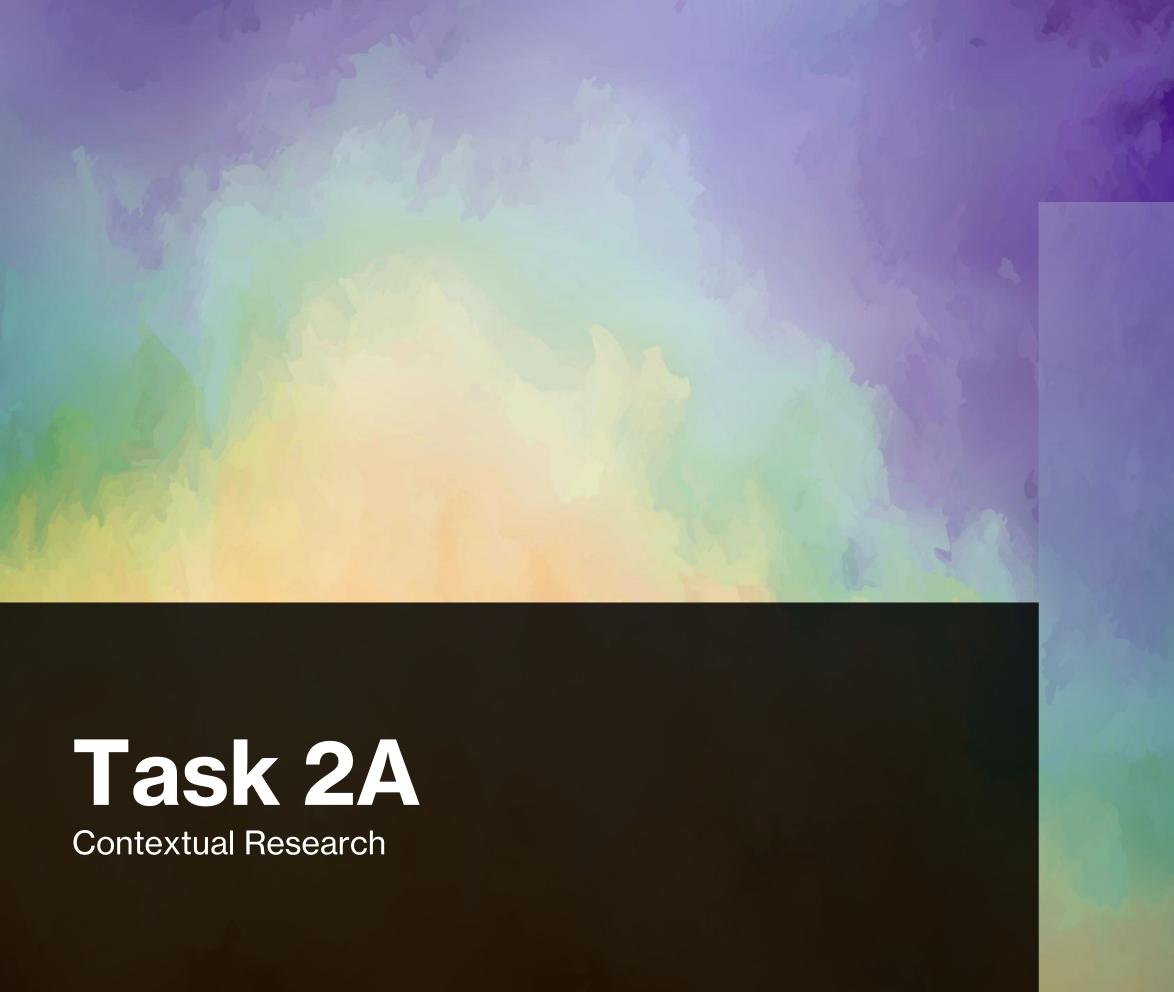
### Aarav Sengupta – User Personality

### HOW POSTERS WORK -April 17, 2015, to January 18, 2016.

This is an exhibition about how designers see. How Posters Work shows the ways dozens of designers from around the world have used the principles of composition, perception, and storytelling to convey ideas and solicit sensations. Some works focus our attention on a single message, while others send the eye on a meandering journey. Graphic designers use form, color, image, and language to seek out simplicity and complexity, flatness and depth, singular moments and stories that unfold. Some designers strive for maximum clarity, while others challenge the viewer to uncover a hidden message. How Posters Work features over 125 pieces from Cooper Hewitt's permanent collection, dating from the turn of the twentieth century to the present.

Why posters? Over the last century, posters have served both as utilitarian communication and as design discourse. Today, posters still appear on city streets, but they are no longer a dominant form of mass communication. As posters circulate through both print and social media, they continue to be a crucial medium for inventing and sharing new visual languages. How Posters Work uses the medium of the poster to explore principles of visual thinking that extend to many forms of design, including branding, packaging, book covers, websites, and motion graphics.

# IDEO SELECTS: WORKS FROM THE PERMANENT COLLECTION - June 22, 2007 to January 13, 2008.

IDEO Selects: Works form the Permanent Collection is curated by the innovation and design firm IDEO. Founded in 1991 in Palo Alto, California, by David Kelley, Bill Moggridge, and Mike Nutall, IDEO calls seven offices on three continents home and comprises more than 500 design thinkers in the disciplines of design, engineering, social science, and business strategy.

For the exhibition, IDEO selected the theme of design thinking, chose works from our collection to illustrate its choice, and designed the installation in which these objects are presentd. Design thinking expresses an IDEO credo: design is a human-centered activity that has the potential to solve problems in business, education, government, and society. It seeks inspiration from the people whom it ultimately serves—the end users—in order to generate meaningful solutions. IDEO's design thinkers regularly conduct fieldwork in places as diverse as the participants' homes, workplaces, and communities, gaining empathy for individuals and contexts in order to solve design challenges. According to Kelley, the firm's approach is "much more about going out into the world not having a point of view, and just finding these latent needs that are obvious...We try to get into the right general area first, rather than just accepting what the problem is."

In creating this exhibition, IDEO reversed its approach. With each object, IDEO invites the viewer to explore how a designer or maker came to understand the end user's environment, pursuits, and needs, and drew upon them to create an object. In contemplating the perspectives and exchange between designer and user, visitors can experience firsthand the elements of design thinking.

IDEO is the first firm to serve as a guest curator in the Museum's exhibition series in the Nancy and Edwin Marks Gallery, devoted to featuring objects in Cooper-Hewitt's permanent collection.

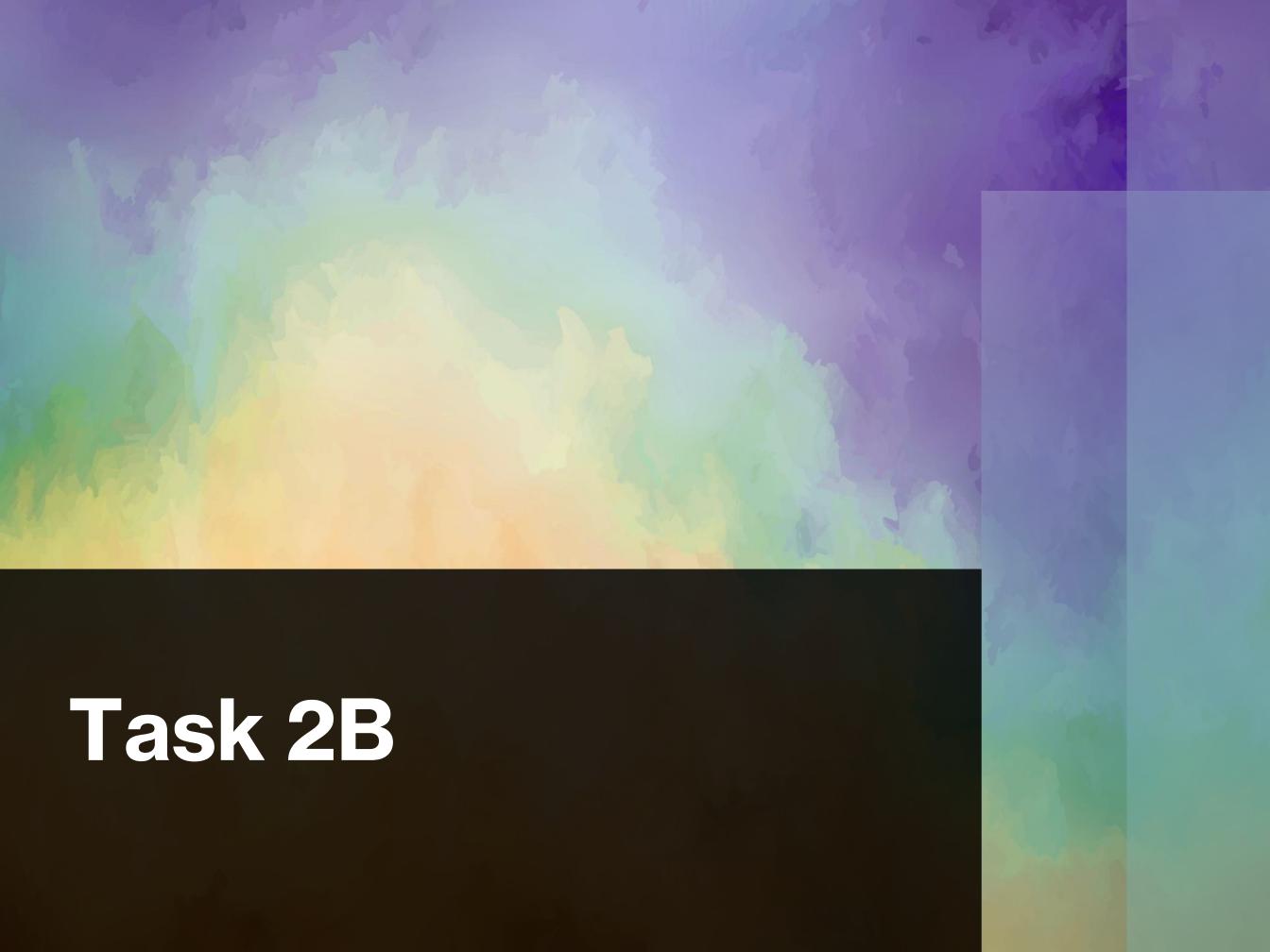

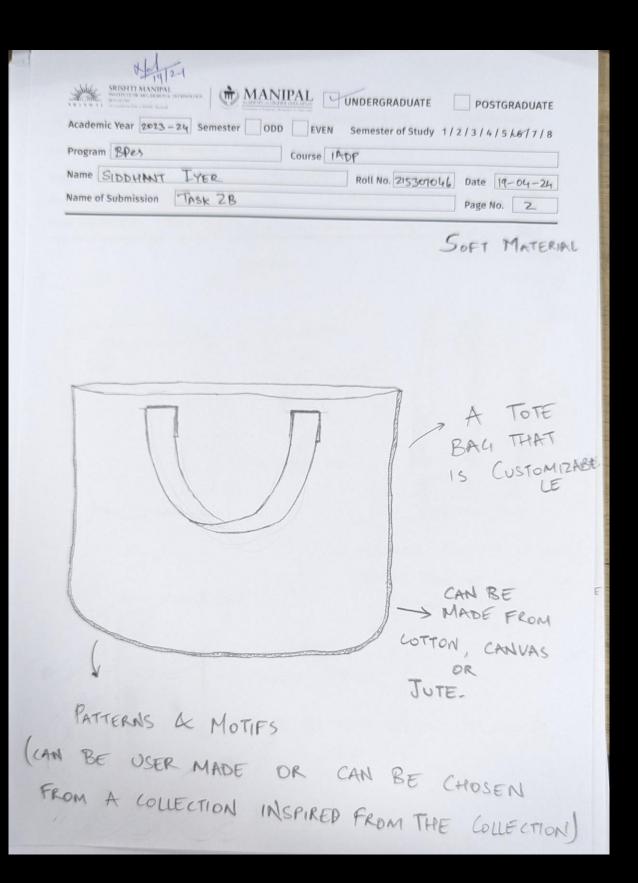

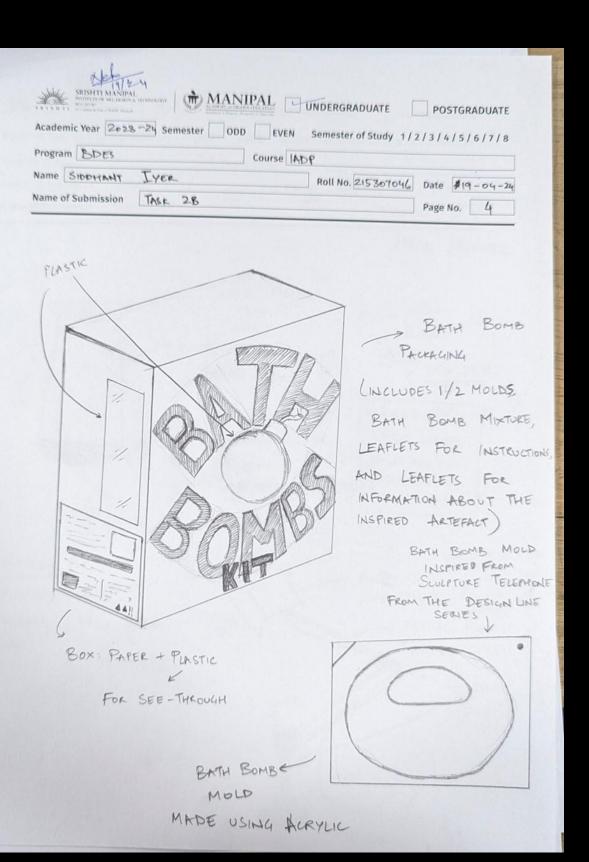
- Miniature Design Object Replicas: Miniature replicas of iconic design objects from the museum's collection,

## Production Methods – Mass Production

#### **Card Design**

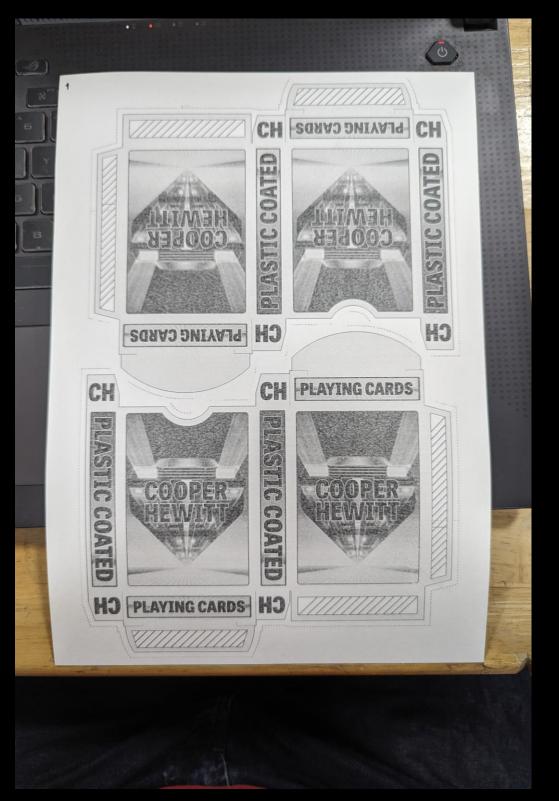
- To Design the cards, it is easy to use the master templates and customize the design accordingly
- Exporting it becomes easy too, as the file is already set to the correct dimensions
- The layout has been optimized to fit maximum number of cards on a single A3 Sheet
- Once cut, the card has to be coated with a layer of plastic and be imprinted with a pattern to achieve the air cushion finish and be easier to shuffle and play with.

#### **Box Design**

- To make the card box, the template can be easily edited to customize the Design
- To Print the Card Box, the design is optimized to print 2 boxes per A4 sheet, or 4 boxes per A3 sheet.

#### **Cutting the Boxes & Cards**

- To cut the boxes and cards, a die can be made to cut the same shape out precisely every time.
   Manual cutting can also be used to achieve the same result.
- For Packaging, the box could have heat shrink plastic around the outside, and also have barcodes and other identification stickers stuck to this.

#### Reflection

The process of conceptualizing, designing, and producing custom card sets with various features was a fascinating journey that led to me acquiring a lot of knowledge and information on print-based media and products. Upon receiving the first task, I was a bit confused as to which path I should focus on to arrive to the final outcome. This is when I started to conceptualize multiple ideas that ranged from keychains and coffee mugs to other artifacts like playing cards which I ultimately ended up taking forward. Since the Cooper Hewitt museum already had an existing store, the basic Idea was to make something that doesn't already exist, while also being an artefact that could be appealing to a wide range of people and also help to depict the rich collection of artefacts housed within the museum itself.

As the design took shape, considerations for packaging and presentation came into play. Will the cards be shipped with an informative plaque, a collectible display box, or perhaps be accompanied by a display stand? While working on task 3A, I figured out that having multiple decks of cards, each inspired by a different category of artefact housed within the museum would be the way to go. I also thought to incorporate the original images of the artefact as the face for each different card, to make it more informative.

Throughout the process, there was a delicate balance between creativity and practicality, and this shaped the final outcome heavily. Ultimately, the process of creating custom card sets was insightful and was a great learning experience for me.
